

Loiola Monumental Complex

The Loiola Sanctuary monumental complex consists of a series of buildings that were gradually constructed around the medieval Tower House, known today as the 'Santa Casa' or Holy House.

In the centre, the Loiola Basilica stands out impressively among this group of religious and spiritual buildings, dominated by a dome and preceded by a wide portal decorated in Churrigueresque, the exuberant style of the Spanish baroque.

The Loyola family's Tower House - the Holy House

The old medieval Tower House, ancestral home to the Oñaz y Loyola noble family and the place where Iñigo de Loyola was born in 1491 and later devoted himself to God in 1521, is the core of the Loiola Sanctuary and its reason for being.

The lower half part of this impressive house is built of stone and is practically windowless; a genuine stronghold, it was built in the late fourteenth century by Iñigo's great-great-grandfather, Beltrán Ibáñez de Loyola.

The upper half, built of brick and clearly Mudejar in style, with numerous windows and four ornamental sentry-boxes at the angles, adorned with festoons of Mudejar interlacings, it is a palace rather than a military tower. It is a reconstruction built in 1460 by Iñigo's grandfather, Juan Pérez de Loyola.

Today it is open to the public, and can be visited with an audio guide that explains the life and works of St. Ignatius, and also shows an overview of what the Oñaz Loyolas' life was like, through the different rooms of the house. The most outstanding room is the Chapel of the Conversion, on the top floor of the building, which is where St. Ignatius overcame life-threatening surgical operations. As a convalescent, it was here and in the chapel of his home that he began to read about Christ and the Saints, discovering that he needed to change his lifestyle and become a pilgrim in search of Christ. He did so, and became St. Ignatius of Loyola.

3 Loiola Basilica

The basilica, a clear example of Baroque architecture, began to be constructed in the seventeenth century and was inaugurated in 1738, in honour of St. Ignatius.

This impressive church was designed by the Italian architect Carlo Fontana, a disciple of Bernini, in the form of a small Vatican, and built by the Basque masters Zaldua, Lecuna and Ignacio Íbero. Consistently built in the same style; circular ground plan topped by a majestic dome and a graceful lantern. The Churrigueresque high altar

has housed a silver statue of


St. Ignatius since 1758.



The Ignatian Way


Ignacio de Loyola in 1522 decided to become a pilgrim and traveled 650 km. in 27 stages from Loiola to Manresa.




